There is no doubting that the launch, in June, of the "Diverse Voices" training resource for intercultural competence development was ICOS' highlight event of 2015. The launch which was generously hosted by RCSI gave recognition to the three years of investment which had gone into this project and the collaborate effort involved which had seen ICOS record and edit many hours of interviews with international students as well as academic and support staff across five institutions. ICOS now routinely draws on this resource to enhance its own training and it may be no coincidence that 2015 also saw a substantial increase in ICOS' training output. We hope that our members and others interested in intercultural awareness training will find it equally useful.

On a less positive note, the college closure crisis, which dominated 2014, continued into 2015 and ICOS was again at the forefront in offering support to displaced students. Fortunately, the introduction of reforms and strengthened compliance measures resulted in fewer closures as the year progressed. ICOS' main focus then turned to getting timely information out to students on the new regulations which would have a direct impact on them such as the standardisation of student working hours and restrictions to the list of visa eligible courses.

ICOS continues to be very proud of its association with the Irish Aid Fellowship Programme and 2015 was another good year for the programme. Irish Aid made over new 100 awards to qualified



candidates selected from Ireland's partner countries. Meanwhile, the results of finishing fellows continue to impress with most candidates achieving honours grades. Work on developing a dedicated website for Irish Aid Fellowships was a major sub project in 2015 and the new website was close to launch at the end of the year.

I take this opportunity to thank everyone who has contributed to ICOS' work during the year and especially to my colleagues on the Board and to the hardworking ICOS staff.

Policy and Standards

Advocacy

ICOS seeks to act as a voice for both students and higher education institutions in advocating for good policy and practice in international education.

As a response to the college closure crisis, significant reforms of the international education sector and student immigration were announced by the Government in September 2014 and May 2015 (see panel). These reflected measures advocated for by ICOS with regard to learner protection and escrow. The reforms provided a significant backdrop to the organisation's work during the year.

Also important were meetings and consultations with the Government in the context of development of Ireland's new International Education Strategy for 2016-2020.

In 2015, ICOS actively represented members' interests on national level groups, attended meetings and prepared written responses to consultations as needed. ICOS also provided comment to the media on the reforms as required. This work was particularly evident early in the year. In addition, ICOS continued to participate on members' behalf at quarterly meetings with INIS and the GNIB where ICOS members' questions on student immigration policy and service issues were addressed.

ICOS also represented members on relevant national fora concerned with student learning and student support services ensuring that the international student perspective is considered in all discussion.

In 2015, ICOS was represented on behalf of members on the following groups:

Key reforms taking effect in 2015

Standardisation of holiday periods during which non-EEA students can engage in full-time work.

Reduction of visas duration for English Language courses to 8 months (previously I year)

Launch of Interim List of Eligible Programmes (ILEP) as a replacement for the Internationalisation Register, significantly reducing the number of visa eligible courses.

Mandatory learner protection requirements for private colleges seeking inclusion on the ILEP.

Requirement that private colleges maintain a separate account facility to safeguard student advance payments.

New requirements including a clear declaration of ownership, shadow directors, physical infrastructure and teaching capacity.

Services to Members and Students

Training

ICOS' training output significantly increased in 2015. The organisation delivered 35 (+20) training courses in cross-cultural awareness and communication; supporting international students and teaching in a cross-cultural environment in 14 (+6) different higher education institutes (HEIs) reaching close to 300 (+100) academic and student support staff.

In an additional development in 2015, ICOS also delivered courses to students directly reaching an estimated 350 Irish and international students across 3 HEIs. Evaluation indicated a very high level of overall satisfaction with ICOS courses, with a

large percentage of participants noting that their knowledge and skills had been increased.

ICOS also presented at a number of conferences during the year including:

'Diverse Voices: Listening to International Students' DVD and training guide

With the Minister for Education in attendance, ICOS successfully launched 'Diverse Voices' on I I June in a high profile and well attended event hosted by the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland.

The new pack comprised a DVD with thematic resources drawing on extensive video interviews with international students and a 130 page training guide to support staff development work in higher education institutions.

Information and Advice

In 2015, ICOS continued to develop and update its website which aims to provide important information on studying in Ireland for International students and on ICOS services for members.


The organisation also maintained a dedicated college closures blog and continued to offer specific support to students affected by the 17 closures in 2014 and 2015.

ICOS provided regular news updates to its members and supporters through ICOS' Facebook page. The number of 'followers' continued to grow markedly throughout the year, from 1,832 at the end of 2014 to 3790 at the end of 2015 (+107%)

A particular emphasis in 2015 was on offering as much information as possible on reform measures which would have a direct impact on students especially the standardisation of working hours (effective from I January 2015) and restriction on the number of visa eligible courses, with the first changes implemented in June 2015.

Changes affecting English Language providers were delayed until January 2016 but ICOS was active in getting messaging to students about the new rules in order that students made informed choices about their choice of provider. Our messaging was particularly strong on the issue of learner protection.

ICOS continued to provide a telephone and email advice service for international students, staff in immigrant advice centres and higher education institutions. ICOS also mediated in a significant number of individual cases involving students who were experiencing problems.



Shelbourne College Scandal: After halting classes abruptly in November 2014, the college failed to re-start as promised in January. By then, ICOS had built evidence that over 100 would-be students had never been repaid their advance fees after being declined visas. Over €500,000 was unaccounted for. Overview

ICOS is happy to report another successful year in respect of the management of the Irish Aid Fellowship Programme, which achieved all its main targets in terms of quality of applications and number of fellows completing successfully. 2014 had seen increased numbers and a growing diversity of schemes under the Irish Aid fellowship umbrella and this trend continued into 2015.

2015 in brief

- ICOS processed 138 applications for Irish Aid Fellowships across its four different strands. Ultimately, 83 fellows were offered awards in Irish higher education institutions with a further 27 offered awards for study in region.
- As part of a new contract with Irish Aid, ICOS co-ordinated the development of a dedicated website for the Irish Aid fellowship programme
 www.irishaidfellowships.ie
 which greatly enhances the visibility of the programme and provides information to all major stakeholders.
- ICOS supported the development of Irish Aid's fellowship alumni networks, managing a database of 1330 (+79) records and moderating a Facebook group which had 285 (+41) members at the end of 2015.

- Greater visibility of the fellowships through the development of case study and other materials and the use of the web

Outcomes

An analysis of results achieved by completing fellows carried out in 2015 highlights the success of the programme and underlines the fact that Irish Aid is funding worthy candidates in a position to contribute significantly to capacity building upon their return home. 100% of the 2014-15 fellows who completed studies in Ireland in 2015 received honours grades

in their final awards with 25% achieving 1st class honours. ICOS completed two tracking studies of former fellows in 2015 with encouraging results regarding reported rates of either promotion on return or the assignment of additional responsibilities.



Flavian Majenga Lihwa from Tanzania undertook the 2015-16 MSc in Sustainable Development at DIT. He featured as one of seven case studies that ICOS provided to Irish Aid for 2015.

Organisational Development

Governance

Strengthening ICOS' Board and following best practice in terms of governance of the organisation remains a priority for ICOS. The Board met five times during 2015 and at its December meeting tabled a special briefing on Governance and the Charity Sector with expert input provided by the Wheel. This allowed for detailed discussion on various aspects of ICOS' compliance with required standards.

In 2015, Stephen Robinson, Director, Champlain College Dublin continued in his role as Chair of ICOS with Kevin Geoghegan, Griffith College Dublin, and Donal McAlister, IT Carlow, continuing in their roles as Vice Chair and Honorary Treasurer respectively.

National / International Networking

ICOS keeps up to date and maintains its international profile through membership of UKCISA, the UK Council for International Student Affairs and the EAIE, the European Association for International Education. At national level, ICOS is involved in a number of networking forums including the Immigrant Information Network which regularly meets with officials in the GNIB and INIS. ICOS is a member of Dóchas and the Wheel and also liaises with immigrant support organisations such the Migrant Rights Centre of Ireland (MRCI) and the Immigrant Council for Ireland (ICI).

Communications

Preliminary work and discussions were held with a web developer with a view to major redevelopment work on ICOS' website with targeted completion of the work in 2016. In the meantime, the existing website was reviewed and upgraded as far as possible. The aim will be to move to a new more user friendly hosting platform which will be able to incorporate more dynamic content such as video.

ICOS also reviewed and upgraded its ICT systems generally in 2015 and engaged a new service provider for IT support which has worked well so far and also resulted in some savings.

Dóchas Code of Conduct on Images and Messages

ICOS is a signatory to the Dóchas Code of Conduct on Images and Messages, which provides a framework which organisations can refer to when designing and implementing their public communication strategy.

ICOS was represented at the annual Code review meeting held by Dóchas and new staff and volunteers were provided with information on the Code and a web-based feedback mechanism is provided for comment from members of the public.

Tribute: John Magoye RIP

ICOS regrets the sad passing on 20 November 2015 of John Magoye, Honorary Member and long-time friend and supporter of ICOS.
